Sammy came to apply for our sponsorship in 2005 as a skinny 15-year-old orphan who had completed his primary school with excellent marks. We interviewed him and were impressed, and he entered Lenana School where he consistently came top of his class. After completing secondary he travelled to the Masai Mara where he volunteered as a class assistant in Mara Rianta Primary School for his community service incidentally learning the Maa language at the same time. He chose accountancy as a career and joined Governors' Camp in 2009 as a trainee accountant, being sponsored by them to complete his accountancy qualifications and staying with them until 2018. In 2018 he started his own tour operating company, Hodari Africa Safaris and later also Hodari Africa Hospitality Solutions providing software to the Kenyan tourism industry.

His company grew and in 2020 he took on Dennis Nyamu, another KSC "graduate", as a junior accountant.

We are thrilled to see our KSC old boys creating successful companies and taking on their younger brothers to join them. We helped him to get a licence to open a business in a good position on a crossroad and his business has flourished. He earned enough to purchase a car, now runs a taxi service as well and is well-known in the community. Lawrence trained as a mechanic and had a more chequered career but finally was taken on by Ken to help in selling flowers. He always greets his customers with a huge smile. Yet another K.S.C. team!



A couple of brave young men told of building good lives, with good jobs, marriages and family and then a downward slide into drugs and poverty. They were salutary tales for our younger students to hear, and the explanation of how they climbed out of addition and despair was courageous and inspirational. We thank them all.

They concluded by saying that as a group they would like to sponsor one student each year. For 2024 the student selected is Jephtar Reeves, who will be going into his final year at Kabianga High School. He was an academic prize-winner this year, and has also been extremely helpful throughout all the holidays in giving tuition to younger students who might be struggling.

The Dinka people of South Sudan call this "throwing the stick forward". We are proud that our former students have chosen this path.
